Champions Ride Celebrates 50 Years

You don't want to miss this one! Champions Ride will be celebrating its 50th Anniversary when the chute gates swing open on August 6 at the

Home On The Range (HOTR) arena near Sentinel Butte, ND—right where the legendary saddle bronc match began.

Most of you know the story of the colorful history of the premiere saddle bronc match commemorating fifty years on August 6, 2006. Jim and Tom Tescher, top professional bronc riders of the era, felt a saddle bronc-riding match featuring North Dakota

cowboys competing against the top riders in the world would bring spectators from many areas to see the best hands around matched against legendary bucking horses. As predicted, people came from miles to see the show at the natural arena nestled in the hills at HOTR. The rest is history. Proud of its western heritage, HOTR was honored to have Champions Ride inducted into the North Dakota Cowboy Hall of Fame in 2000 as the Special Achievement inductee—only the second event inducted in that category.

The 50th Anniversary Champions Ride will feature the usual saddle bronc riding, but for a twist of nostalgia, the committee has arranged for a calf-roping match between two father/son teams. It has been many years since there has been calf roping at Champions Ride—especially calf roping of this caliber.

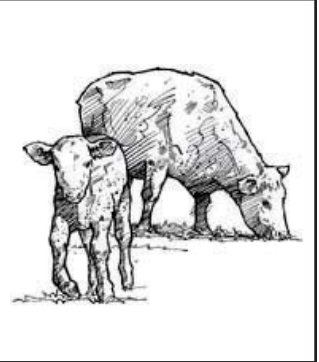
Tree Planting - A Day of Work, An Evening of Relaxation

Brother Sam Celebrates 30 Years of Working With Children

“But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such there is no law.”

Galatians 5:22

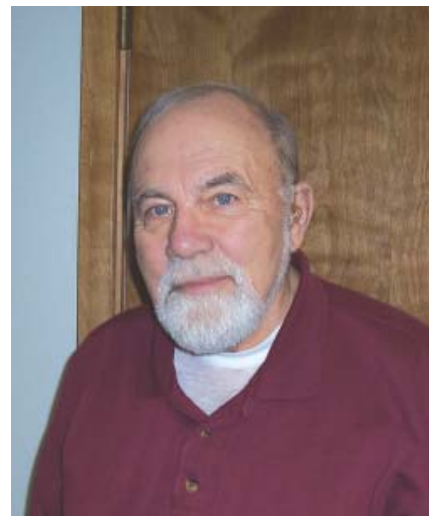
This bible verse truly describes Salvatorian Brother Samuel Larson, who celebrated his 30th anniversary of working with children at Home On The Range (HOTR). This active, vibrant man has seen a lot of things and many changes over the years and remains dedicated to do all he can.

In 1975 Brother Sam visited HOTR and completed his interview with Father William Fahnländer. At that time, there were 3 counselors and 48 boys at HOTR. Brother Sam spent

some time with Father Fahnländer and met some of the other staff. He was told he was a “God-send” and knew in his heart he was meant to work at HOTR.

After working as a counselor for just two weeks, Brother Sam was put in charge of the entire south wing of the boys’ dorm. This meant he would be responsible for 20 boys. It was more than a full-time job; he worked 24 hours a day, 6 days a week. Brother Sam not only worked out of his office, but he also lived and slept there. When asked how he supervised the boys at night when they were sleeping, he winked and said, “I slept with one eye open and one eye shut.”

In 1979 HOTR started sending the residents to SEARCH. This was a



beginning trend for the spiritual department. Brother Sam recalls a specific time when a young man was asked to go to SEARCH for the first time. The boy had a history of being a heavy marijuana user and would outwardly tell people that there was no better high. “Doug” had been involved in the spiritual program, but didn’t seem to commit himself to believe in a higher power. After attending the weekend SEARCH, Doug sought out Brother Sam and confessed, “You were right, Bro... spirituality is the highest high.”

Brother Sam has seen many spiritual transformations over the years – some inspired by him and his STEP group. Based on the 12 steps of AA, Brother Sam instills the importance of a higher power. With his own spiritual strength and commitment, Brother Sam teaches kids about spirituality and feeds their need for knowledge about God and Christianity. It has become a group that children ask for. One time Brother Sam had a rather rambunctious group of boys, cancelled the STEP group, and sent the boys back to their rooms. One young man wouldn’t leave, and stood in the hallway and sobbed. He pleaded with Brother Sam to



When Father Cassidy founded Home On The Range, one major component of his program was spirituality. Now, 56 years later, this is still true. Brother Samuel Larson personally leads services for both the staff and children. During Holy Week, Brother Sam led the Ash Wednesday service. It was a very solemn and spiritual moment as many boys, girls, and staff were blessed with a cross of ashes on their forehead. For some of the children, this was the first time in their lives to receive this special blessing.

continue the STEP group because it was the only time he got to learn about spirituality. This inspired Brother Sam to continue his class and work harder at helping kids.

The HOTR spiritual department now has two youth ministers that minister to the children through bible study, praise night, private consultations and Christian music. Brother Sam says he

has time to do other things with the kids he couldn't do before. The child

care staff actively participate in the activities and Church, and they encourage the kids to also become involved. It is Brother Sam's hope that the spiritual department can maintain its strength and momentum, because that in itself will substantiate the future of HOTR and its children.

Brother Sam has become well known for his beautiful, hand-made cards for birthdays, encouragement or in sympathy. Many friends, employees and children have been blessed with his creative cards. Brother Sam makes sure that each child at HOTR receives not only a card, but also a small gift. It is common to see him help clean up after a banquet or help move chairs and tables for presentations by guest speakers. He always has new ideas on how to re-use different pieces of equipment or furniture, and recycles

aluminum cans and cardboard to conserve the environment while simultaneously saving the recycling

Home On The Range has 85 full-time employees, of which 47 work directly with the children in the dorms. Their primary responsibility is to form relationships with the children and teach them the social skills curriculum. This can be a tough and stressful job, and Home On The Range established a new program to honor these hard-working and dedicated staff. "Residential Specialist of the Month" originated this last March. Employees are nominated by their peers, and the winner receives a Home On The Range shirt embroidered with "Employee of the Month" and their name and date engraved on a special plaque.



Shamrock Project

For 43 years, the North Dakota Knights of Columbus have been helping Home On The Range with their Shamrock project. During St. Patrick's Day, councils across the state promote the green chenille Shamrock pins and ask for a free-will gift. This year, many councils participated and raised more than \$12,500. The monies supplement the programs and activities for the boys and girls. You will recognize many of these horses from the NFR and other televised rodeo events. It is their support that has earned Champions Ride its great reputation.

A Cowboy Reunion is scheduled that includes past contestants and former champions. They will be introduced and on hand for autographs prior to the start of the rodeo. Home On The Range is proud of the fact that, through

Spirituality Offers Security and Healing

established 56 years ago, its very foundation was spiritual and it remains the same today.

Home On The Range's Spiritual Department is available to each of the residents that come here. We realize that they have come from different

backgrounds, many of which include the abuse of drugs and alcohol. We provide a secure environment that enables our residents to step out of their life situations to experience the true joy and happiness of being connected to the source of life – Jesus Christ.

When residents first arrive at HOTR they are interviewed in the Chapel to determine their spiritual background. At this time they are asked to pick the church that they will be attending weekly. If parents have a church preference for their child, that is honored.

Once these young people begin to experience God's love for them, they are better able to let go of what has held them captive in the past. When the desires of their flesh are selfish, they live in opposition to the

desires of the Spirit of God within them. If they learn to live by the Spirit, they will not seek the sinful gratification of their desires.

We teach them about the gifts of the Spirit listed in Galatians 5:22-23, which are:

- Love replaces hatred and unforgiveness.
- Joy replaces hopelessness.
- Peace replaces fear and anxiety.
- Patience replaces impatience.
- Kindness replaces rudeness.
- Faithfulness replaces a lack of loyalty.
- Gentleness replaces harshness.
- Self-control replaces a lack of discipline.

All of these "Gifts of the Holy Spirit" help our young people to work on the issues that brought them here. We try to teach the residents involved in the Spiritual Program that true happiness comes when they embrace the teachings of Christ and live them out daily in their lives. Being a Christian doesn't imply living a life of pious misery without fun, excitement or enjoyment, but it does involve being able to experience life to the fullest. Jesus said in John 10:10, "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life and have it to the full."
